## **Sweet Potato Pie**

#### Ingredients:

1 frozen pie crust (or homemade if preferred \*not included in this recipe)

½ cup unsalted butter cut into cubes or slices

2 lbs sweet potatoes washed and dried

½ cup light brown sugar packed

½ cup granulated sugar

½ cup of evaporated milk

2 eggs room temperature

2 eggs room temperature

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

½ teaspoon cinnamon

½ teaspoon nutmeg ¼ teaspoon ginger

2 tablespoons orange or pineapple juice

1 ½ tablespoons all-purpose flour

- 1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees
- Pierce sweet potatoes with a fork all over; place on foil-lined baking sheet and bake for 45 minutes or until very tender
- Take the unsalted butter and make brown butter by putting on medium-high heat until it gets frothy and has a nutty smell – be careful not to burn!

#### Set aside butter in a glass dish and let cool

- 5. After sweet potatoes have cooled scoop out the meat and discard the skin
- 6. In a large bowl mix the sweet potatoes until creamy (thick puree)
- 7. Add in the brown butter until smooth
- Mix in the brown sugar, granulated sugar, evaporated milk, eggs, vanilla extract, and seasonings/juice until well combined
- 9. Pour into the pie crust and bake in the oven on 350 degrees for 55 minutes
- Remove from the oven and let it cool completely; and the middle is firmly set.

# HISTORY OF HALLOWEEN



Halloween has its roots in the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, which marked the end of the harvest season and the beginning of winter. Celts believed that on this night, the boundary between the living and the dead was blurred, allowing spirits to return to the earth. To ward off these spirits, people lit bonfires and wore costumes made of animal skins. The Chrisitan Church established All Saints' Day on November 1st, with All Hallows' Eve observed the night before. Over time, pagan and Christian traditions blended, evolving All Hallows' Eve into our modern-day Halloween celebrations. During the 19th century, Irish and Scottish immigrants brought Halloween customs to North America, including the carving of jack-o'-lanterns based on the legend of Stingy Jack. Children began the practice of trick-or-treating, initially called "guising," where they performed small tricks or songs in exchange for food or coins. Halloween parties grew in popularity in the early 20th century, featuring games like bobbing for apples, which had roots in ancient fortune-telling rituals. Today, Halloween is a major cultural event marked by costume contests, haunted houses, and horror films, blending ancient superstition with modern festivity.
